

Susan Marie Turner, PhD, is an independent researcher and educator (www.susanmarieturner.ca). She is a senior practitioner of Institutional Ethnography. Her doctoral thesis, *Municipal Planning, Land Development and Environmental Intervention: an Institutional Ethnography*, received the 2004 OISE/University of Toronto Outstanding Thesis of the Year Award. She received the Dorothy E. Smith Scholar Activist Award from the Society for the Study of Social Problems Institutional Ethnography Division in 2010, recognizing both her innovative method of mapping complex organizational and institutional processes and her collaborative scholar-activist work. Dr. Turner was Coordinator of the SSHRC-funded Community University Research Alliance (CURA) Rural Women Making Change (2004-2009) working with rural women's organizations. She provided research training and support to Indigenous organizations in the Aboriginal Sexual Violence Community Response Initiative funded by the Ontario Women's Directorate (2012-2015), and continued to co-research with Ganohkwasra of The Six Nations of the Grand River Territory.

She has given IE Mapping workshops and weekend workshops on Incorporating Texts in IE and week-long IE Working Intensives with Dorothy Smith annually at the Centre for Women's Studies in Education OISE/UT and Department of Leadership, Higher and Adult Education since 2009.

She was Sessional Instructor in International Development and Sociology at the University of Guelph (1994-2008) and Special Graduate Faculty (2005-2008) and 1999-2004 managed a large academic advising office.
